The Fairview Inn Bed and Breakfast is rich with history of Jackson, Mississippi. Constructed in 1908, at the turn of the century, Fairview is one of Jackson's landmark mansions and one of the few architecturally designed houses of that period remaining in the city.

The Fairview Inn is located in Jackson at 734 Fairview Street. From I-55 take the Woodrow Wilson Exit, #98A. At the second traffic signal, North State Street, turn left. Go 1 block past the second traffic light at Fairview Street. The Inn is the 1<sup>st</sup> property on the left. We will be meeting and dining in The Carriage Room.

**Mayflower Compact 1620**

*Agreement Between the Settlers at New Plymouth : 1620*

*IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN. We, whose names are underwritten, the Loyal Subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord King James, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. Having undertaken for the Glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian Faith, and the Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the first Colony in the northern Parts of Virginia; Do by these Presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politick, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid: And by Virtue hereof do enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitutions, and Officers, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general Good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due Submission and Obedience.*

*IN WITNESS whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at Cape-Cod the eleventh of November, in the Reign of our Sovereign Lord King James, of England, France, and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth, Anno Domini; 1620.*

Historian Braxtel Neely reported a gain of three new members since October 27, 2007: Max Edward Lilly, Susan Jean Mayer Boyd, and Jonny Veleria Byars Antoline. Papers for John G. Roach and Carol Hoszowski have been sent to the Historian General. The current membership total is 164.

Since the fall meeting, Roy Byars' six grandchildren (James Bennett, Audra Byars, Madalyn Byars, Blake Ellis, Wilson Logan, and Alicia Rodriguez) have become Junior members. Charles Fiske was dropped because he turned twenty-five, bringing the Junior membership total to 43.

Treasurer Charles Johnson reported total cash receipts of \$2,607.00 and total cash disbursements of \$2,354.00. As of April 30, 2008, the balance on hand was \$12,530.00. Forty members have not paid dues. Charles will contact each one to try to collect the money.

Deputy Governor Mary Blanks reported on the Mayflower scholarship. Mary, Melinda Hendrix, and Nancy Harrison each visited two high schools with details of the Mayflower scholarship, with negative results. No students applied. After discussion, the Board decided to turn its educational efforts in another direction. Mary suggested that members speak to classrooms in the fall. An appropriate presentation could be put together with suggestions from various members.

Assistant General Helen Buford's illness was discussed. Assuming Helen is unable to go to Plymouth in September, Dr. Dennis Ward will attend in her place.

Charles suggested November 8 as the date for the fall meeting.
